Over the month of August, we again completed several tasks in preparation for new projects starting in September.


GY Wagon Update

WORKING GROUP ACTIVITIES PLANNED 2025

The next projects planned for September are:

1. DISPLAY STAND

• Earlier this year, a generous donation from DEECA provided us with a beautiful display stand. This stand is set to be relocated to make room for the \$500 sleeper plaques, which are presently affixed to the exterior wall of Heritage Coffee and Gifts.



• We plan to position the stand at the end of the platform, ensuring that it enhances both visibility and accessibility for all visitors. This strategic placement will allow passersby to easily view the plaques and engage with the display in a welcoming environment.

2. BIG LOG - TIMBER DISPLAY TRIBUTE

- We are excited to announce that we have been generously gifted an impressive large log by Brett Robins. This striking log will become the centerpiece of a new display on our grounds, showcasing the rich heritage of timber production. Accompanying the log will be an array of memorabilia, including vintage timber saws and various cutting machines that highlight the craftsmanship and technology of the bygone timber industry.
- The log itself is an extraordinary specimen, measuring approximately 6 meters in length and 4 meters in diameter. Its natural beauty and size will create a captivating focal point, inviting visitors to appreciate the importance of timber in our history.







3. VINTAGE TIMBER SAWS AND VARIOUS CUTTING MACHINES TO BE SHOWCASED

• Many older saws and machines were constructed using superior materials and techniques that are challenging to replicate today. This gives them exceptional durability and artistry, qualities that are often hard to find in modern products. They truly exemplify the craftsmanship of a bygone era, especially when contrasted with our current "throwaway" culture.

RECOGNISING AN ANGEL - GLADYS SANDERSON

The Noojee & District Historical Society Inc. is proud to present a permanent photographic display in the 1960 Louvre Van Carriage at the Noojee Heritage Railway Station Precinct. This display coincides with the dedication of the Noojee Reserve, which will be named after a local hero: The Gladys Sanderson Park, now planned for later this year.

We are excited to celebrate her incredible contributions and the many lives she touched! Gladys Sanderson's selflessness and courage have left a lasting mark on the history of Noojee.

Background: On January 13, 1939, Noojee and much of Victoria were devastated by one of the worst bushfires in the state's history—the catastrophic Black Friday bushfires. During this crisis, Gladys Sanderson, who served as the town's assistant postmistress, was the last person able to operate Noojee's telephone switchboard, the area's only communication link. She worked tirelessly to relay urgent messages to isolated families and emergency responders until the post office was engulfed in flames, forcing her to seek shelter in the La Trobe River.

Gladys's extraordinary bravery was widely recognized, and her story made headlines from Warragul to London. In June 1940, she was awarded the Order of the British Empire for "gallantry and devotion to duty."


